More than just a meal project

We secure an Ariia grant this year in conjunction with Meals on Wheels Queensland to undertake further research on the "More Than Just a Meal" Project. The project is designed to use the meal delivery system to undertake a wellness check and reduce social isolation in the community. Often the elderly at home do not a lot of social contact and become isolated. Meals on Wheels volunteers can be the only social contact people have. The project involves training volunteers to have lunch with clients receiving Meals on Wheels. While having lunch undertake a wellness check and an opportunity for the elderly in the community to increase social interactions.

The project explores whether this type of service could be integrated into delivery in Meals on Wheels. Does this service support the community's well-being and reduce social isolation? Is this service clients or families would pay to increase social engagement with the elderly living at home? The project takes several measures and collects field notes to develop a business model. Several Meals on Wheels services have joined in the research across Brisbane. The project is scheduled to Finish in May 2024.

Finance Report (2022-2023)

The financial year ending 30 June 2023, was a successful year for NACI, with a surplus from ordinary activities before tax of \$ 7,840 (prior year \$ 1,459).
